During the month of November, the COVID-19 pandemic continued to be an integral part of Department of Public Safety operations. I followed the statewide statistics on the Department of Health dashboard, which was sent daily by PA Chiefs email. During the month, infection rates continued to escalate causing public safety to return to the strict universal precautions protocols we initiated in the early months of 2020. We maintained the highest levels of safeguard to the public and our public safety personnel who may be exposed to citizens infected with the virus.

Much of my time, as Director and Emergency Management Coordinator, I continued to focus on monitoring the public safety preparedness and response to the potential virus impact to the employees and the Lower Allen Community. I also monitored the PEMA, FEMA, county EMA releases daily, and attended the Wednesday National COVID-19 White House Briefings offered virtually.

We also continued creation of a stockpile of sanitation products, i.e., masks, gloves, gowns, and other protective items to safeguard responders. With the resurgence of the virus, as well as a history of logistics supply failures, this is essential. EMS has been tasked with taking the lead on this and continued to assist with the procurement of N-95, surgical masks, sanitation supplies and hand sanitizers to coordinate all supplies for public safety. Their expertise and assistance have been outstanding.

Overall call volume continued to increase throughout the month. Many of the meetings scheduled for public safety continued to be online through Zoom or Web-ex both within the department and externally. We have been using Microsoft TEAMS through our Township accounts, at times even office-to-office within the building. This practice further limits face-to-face exposure.

The Administrative Order for Public Safety COVID precautions and reporting was updated and re-released to all staff. The policy utilizes the principles of time, distance, and shielding that have long been practiced for hazmat incidents in public safety response. All these elements are applicable to infectious disease as well.

The highlights of October included:

November 10-12 – Attended the virtual CALEA Conference training sessions online. The conference was provided at no cost to accredited agencies. This virtual conference was provided due to the COVID case reports nationwide.

November 17th – Attended an online webinar on the best practices and lessons learned when implementing a body worn camera program.

Attended numerous staff meetings and the public safety coordination meeting.

DEPARTMENT HEAD:

November was very different this year. Usually, two main periods of concern are Thanksgiving Eve, with its heavy bar traffic and proliferation of DUIs, and Black Friday (which usually begins Thanksgiving evening) with attendant crowd, traffic, and theft activities. None of this happened. Thanksgiving Eve was curtailed by the Governor's order and Black Friday was spread over the entire week by most major retailers, avoiding the single day rush for bargains.

Officer Chimel-Freeburn and Officer Fitzkee are progressing through their field training. The Lieutenant. Second-line supervisor interviews were scheduled for 12/3/2020. First-line supervisor written exam is scheduled for 12/11/2020 with interviews to be scheduled in January of 2021.

Throughout the month, Captain Crone attended Board of Commissioners Meetings, Department Head Meetings, Police Command Staff meetings, a Public Safety Coordination meeting, and budget meetings. As a member of the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission, Captain Crone attended that commission's meeting.

Concerns over increased activity at the Capital City Mall prompted a sit-down with mall security staff to discuss strategies for addressing these issues. Operationally, some items were readily able to be incorporated immediately, while others needed to be addressed at the corporate level.

The body-worn camera grant project is on hold until January. A sit-down with the vendor is planned, at which time equipment will be ordered.

The patrol officer of the month is Officer Katie Justh. During November, Ofc Justh handled nine UCR cases, the most on her squad. Out of those, three were officer-initiated arrests, which was more than anyone else in the department for the month of November.

One of those cases involved Ofc Justh and Ofc Newcomer noticing a vehicle that pulled into the Capital City Mall parking, smelling of marijuana. A traffic stop was initiated on the car, and through investigation, drugs and a handgun possessed by a juvenile were located under the passenger seat. The other two self-initiated arrests were for DUI.

On 11/13/20, Ofc Justh assisted her squad with an arrest of three subjects for retail theft at the mall. All three subjects resisted, and physical force was required to take them into custody. Ofc Justh was able to radio for additional backup during the initial chaos of the incident and assisted in controlling the suspects.

On 11/14, during the night, LAPD assisted PSP with a single vehicle crash on Rt 15 N at 581 E. The driver fled the scene and was presumably intoxicated. Ofc Justh located the suspect walking on foot in R.F. Fager's and took him into custody with Ofc Newcomer.

On 11/28, Ofc Justh responded to the Capital City Mall to subdue retail theft suspects who had fled Walmart to the area of the mall. Multiple occupants fled from the vehicle and were followed by Cpl Curtis and Ofc Gelnett. Ofc Justh found a friend of the suspects still driving the suspect vehicle in the lot and detained her. In doing so she also recovered the stolen merchandise from Walmart.

Ofc Justh showed great proactivity during the month which resulted in solid arrests. Good work, and congratulations, Officer Justh!

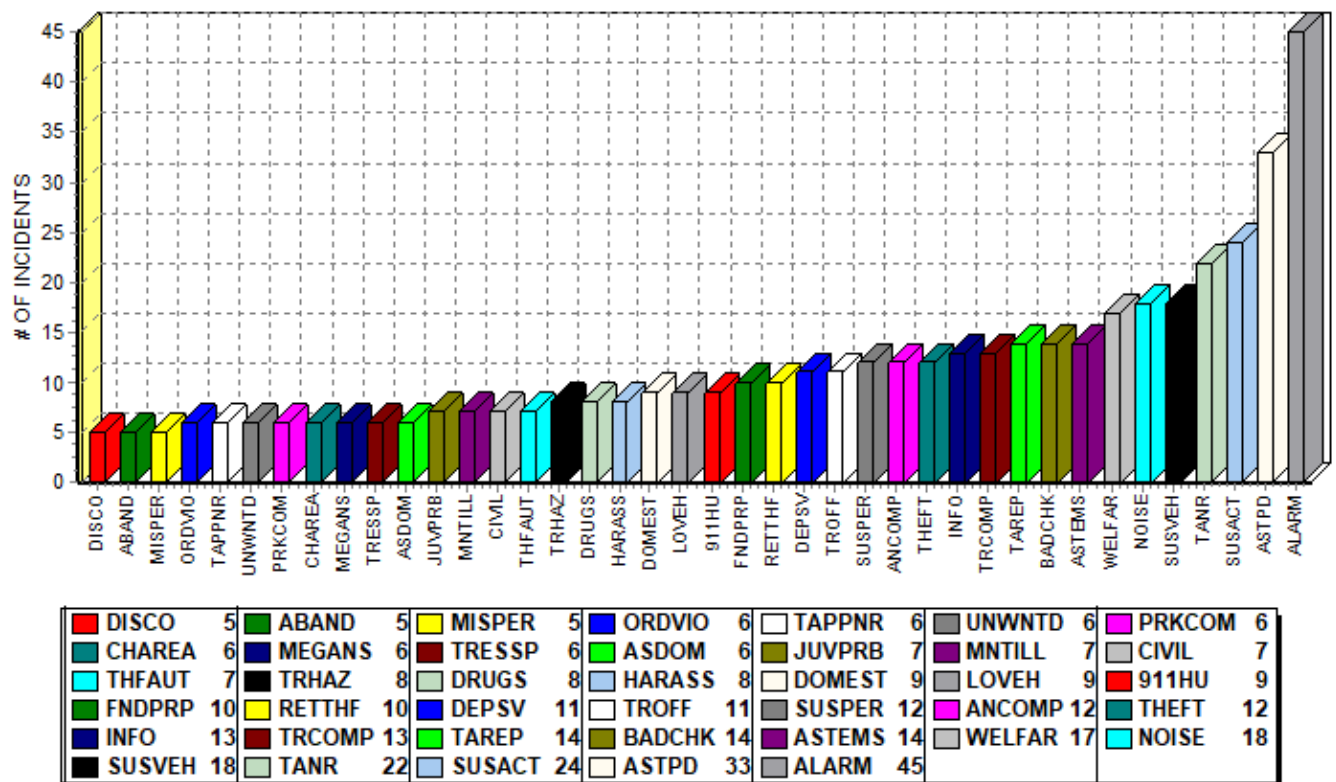

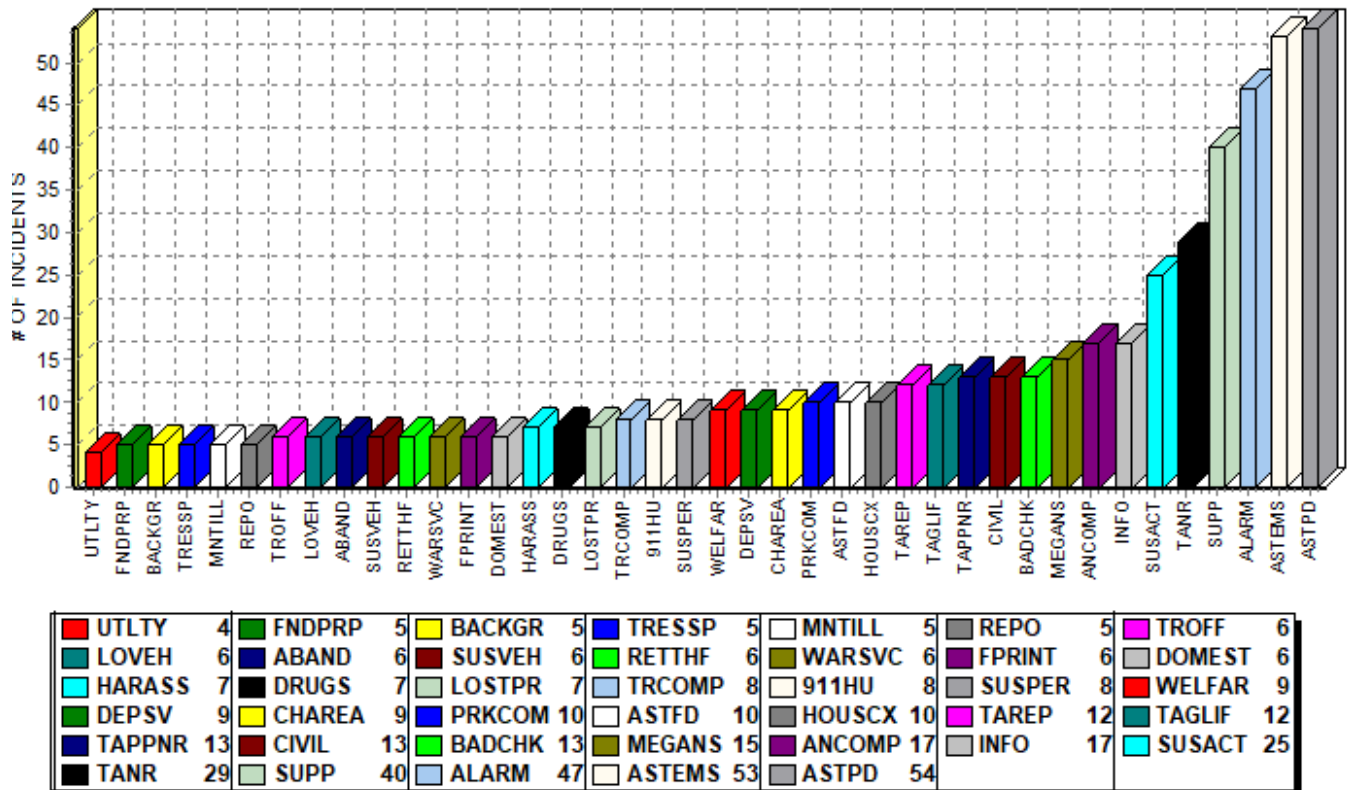
MONTHLY TOP 40 INCIDENT COUNT BY TYPE and SELECTED OFFICER LOG FIGURES

The Lower Allen Twp. Police Dept. (LATPD) had 887 dispatched calls for service from Cumberland County Communications in November 2020. Of those reports, 107 were UCR related.

During the month of November 2020, LATPD made arrests or filed criminal charges on 47 individuals, issued 20 non-traffic citations, 76 traffic citations, 70 warnings, and 24 parking tickets.

There were 43 crashes reported to LATPD in November 2020. Of those 43 crashes, 15 were reportable crashes and 28 were non-reportable crashes.

In November EMS continued to see a steady onslaught of patients suspected of having COVID-19 or confirmed to have COVID-19. In November we saw the most COVID-19 patients we have seen during the pandemic averaging two to three patients a day. Patients who are suspected of COVID-19 or who have COVID-19 require extensive clean-up and additional use of Personal Protective Equipment.

In addition to the normal clean-up process COVID-19 requires a complete wipe down with disinfectant of all surfaces and equipment and the use of spray disinfectant for the patient compartment and cab of the ambulance. The process to return a unit back to service and ready to respond to another call is extended by 45-60 minutes.

The COVID-19 pandemic has greatly increased the use of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). In 2020 ZPPE usage has increased by 3,518 items year to date. The items include N-95 respirators, safety glasses and goggles, face shields, gowns, gloves surgical caps and foot coverings. The increases usage of PPE increase cost.

In November, the efforts of Executive Assistant Dianna Kinsley paid off by successfully obtaining \$ 5,200.00 in grants for EMS. The grant money is being used to purchase advanced reusable N-95 mask, gowns, and surgical caps. Being able to reuse these items safely and effectively will improve the safety of the EMS staff and reduce overall cost. The intention is to have all items purchased before the end of 2020 and be operational in January of 2021.

The wide community spread of COVID-19 has impacted our high call volume facilities, Bethany, The Woods, SCIC and Encompass. Bethany and The Woods have been able to control and contain their outbreaks. We are actively working with the facilities and providing them assistance as requested.

The community spread of COVID-19 has impacted the staff significantly by and greatly magnified the staffing challenges. Since mid-November five (5) staff members have been forced to quarantine due to contact outside of work and one (1) additional staff member tested positive and was off for eighteen (18) days. The source of the staff member who tested positive is unable to be determined.

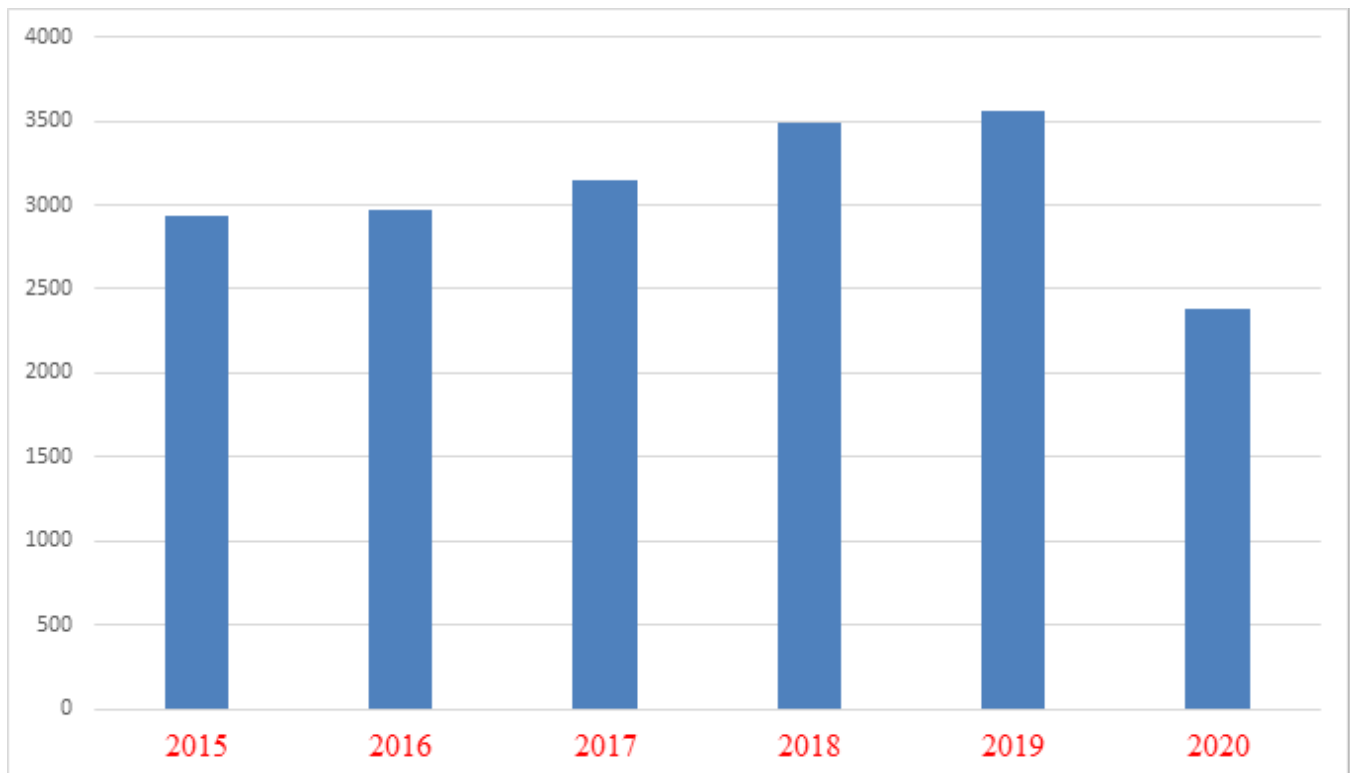
EMS is continuing to advance clinical care during the pandemic and will begin participation in the field administration of anti-biotics in January. The process required approval of the Emergency Health Services Federation and the Bureau of EMS. Staff are required to complete an on-line course continuing education course as part of the requirements to participate in the trial.

EMS call volume is not decreasing because of the COVID-19 second wave. The steady call volume and the addition of COVID-19 patients has increased the workload of the EMS staff. This trend is expected to continue and increase over the next two (2) to three (3) months.

Captain Deaven continues to actively participate in EHSF, PA Bureau of EMS, Pennsylvania Emergency Health Services Council, Ambulance Association of Pennsylvania and Pennsylvania Fire and Emergency Services Institute.

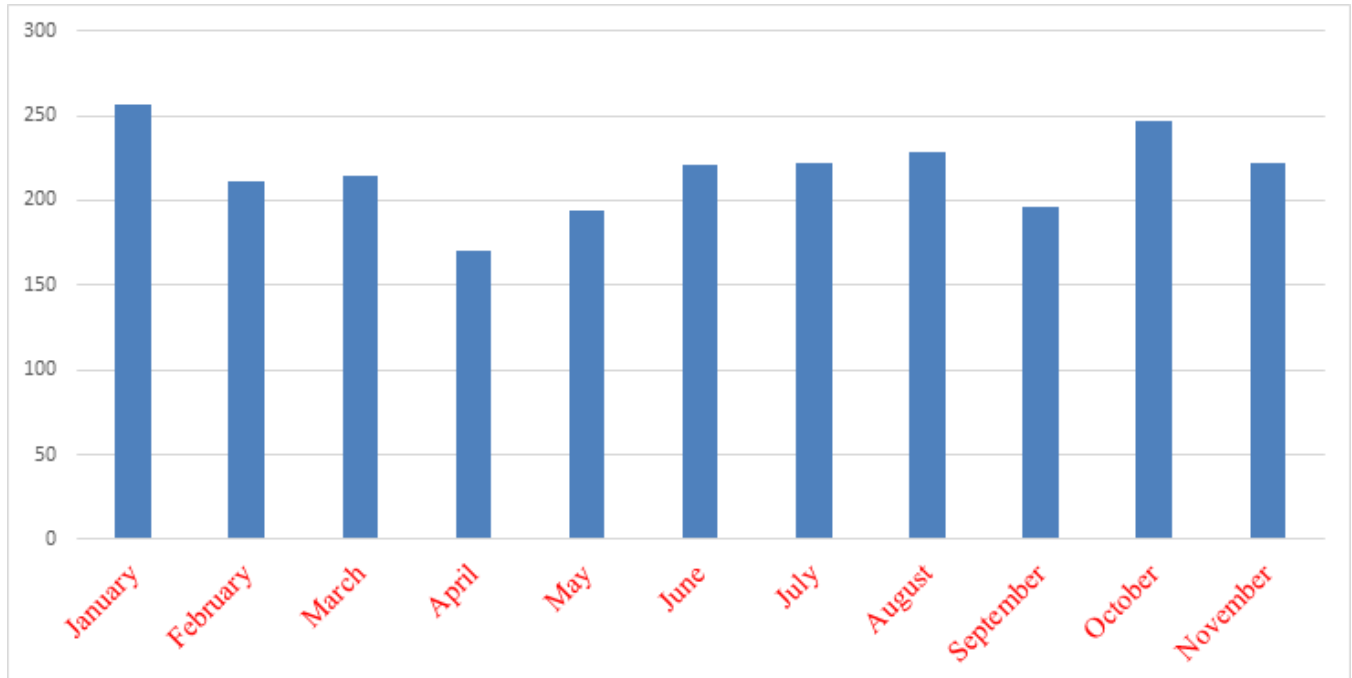
LATEMS has continued to deliver high quality, effective, efficient, and safe patient care directly to their side in every location. In November, LATEMS touched the lives of **222** people.

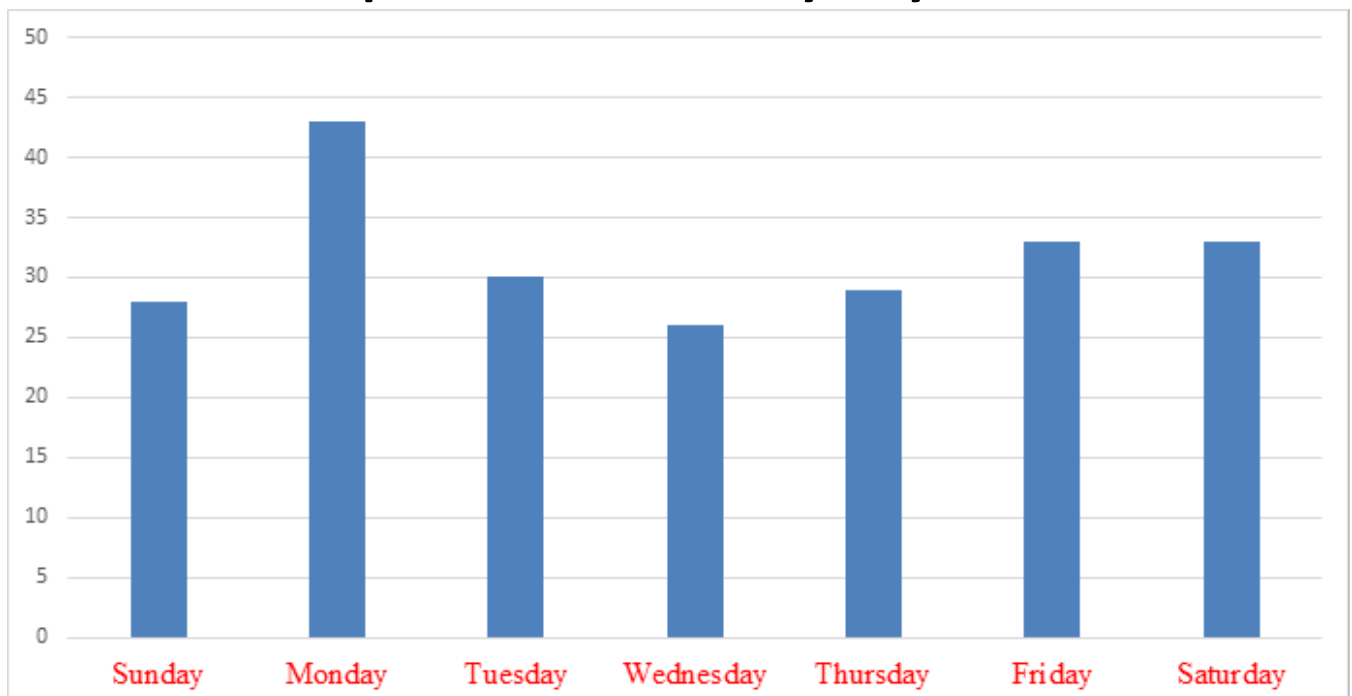

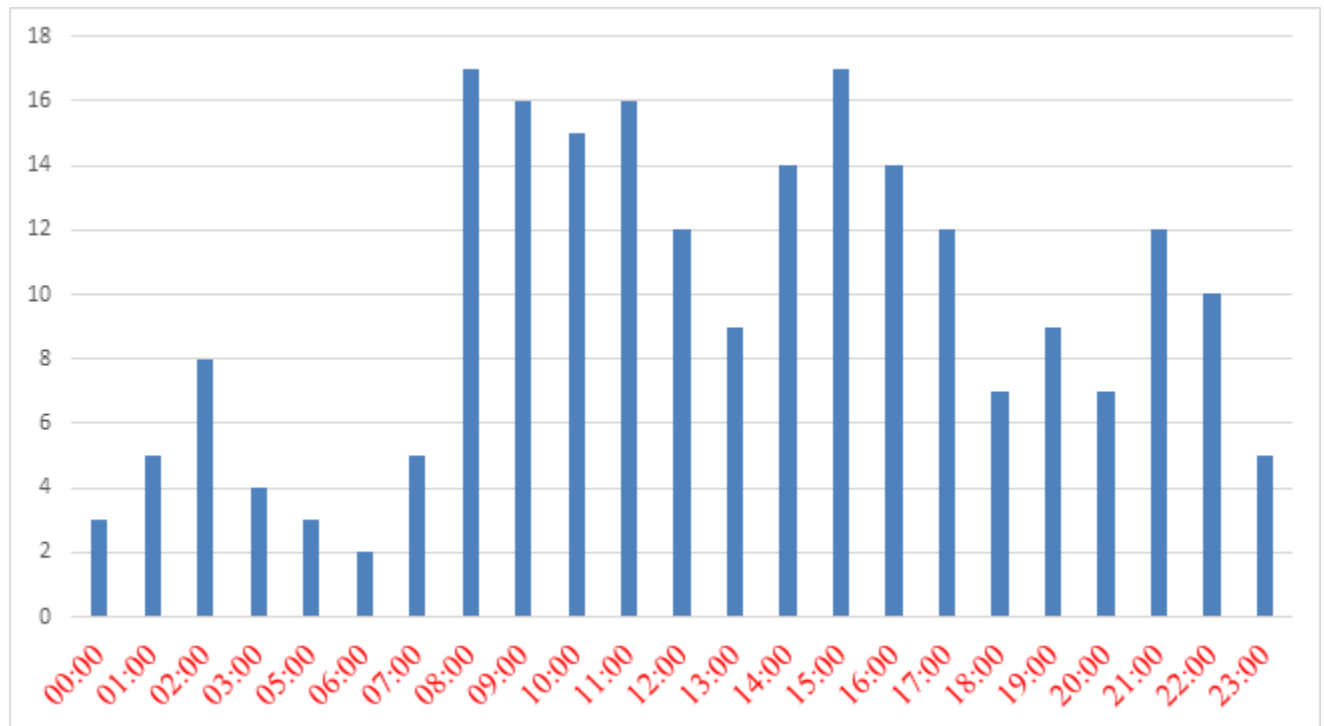
November-Request for Service by Month

Incidents:

On 11/2/2020 in the early morning Lower Allen Fire Company and Lisburn Community Fire Company were dispatched for an Automatic Fire Alarm at 2944 Meridian Drive in the Township. Squad 12 (PSO Kettering and PSO Martin) and Engine 24 (Chief Williamson, Captain Landis, and FF Patrick) responded. As Squad 12 arrived on scene LAPD advised that there was a fire on the second-floor balcony of a multi-unit apartment complex. Squad 12 confirmed that the fire was under control because the sprinkler system activated on the balcony. Truck 29 (Mechanicsburg Fire Dept.) was dispatched and assisted Engine 24 and Squad 12 personnel with salvage and overhaul of the fire area and attic area. Minor damage to the balcony and attic areas.



Items of note from this incident:

- The requirement of sprinklers on the exterior balconies resulted in the fire being held in check upon arrival of fire department.
- The evening of this incident was very windy and would have resulted in a major fire with substantial damage to the complex if not stopped in its early stages.
- Damage to the unit was minimal due to the sprinkler system and the professional work of firefighters to ensure the fire was out but used every means possible to reduce further damage. See email from Service Manager with B&F Partners below.
- A quick response by Squad 12 was ensured by having a PSO Kettering (Full-Time PSO) and PSO Martin (Part-Time PSO) on duty that early morning.
