During September, the COVID-19 incident rate continued to be stable in numbers and acuity. We continue to see reports of staff members infected in non-job-related transmissions, but the severity has continued to be reduced. In general, positive cases were less impactful and persons infected were less sick in general. No changes to personal protective device (PPE) requirements changed however and maximum precaution continued to be urged. The Emergency Health Services Council continued with their briefings via an online presentation that remained every two weeks instead of weekly due to the case declines.

The highlights of September included:

September 7th–Met with the Motorola sales representative to the county to refine and clarify the pricing spreadsheet for radio replacements for the public safety and public works departments.

September 8th—Conducted a second interview, along with Captain Wirth, with the lead candidate for the PSO position that is currently vacant.

September 15th–Submitted public safety department budgets to Finance with this being the deadline date. All staff worked diligently to meet the deadline and stay within the required limits.

September 17th & 18th (Sat/Sun) –Cumberland County Police Chiefs Consortium police testing event held at Carlisle Area High School. The test consists of a physical agility portion which is pass/fail and a written exam which is scored. I administered the written exam this year on both days. As is the previous year attendance was limited despite around 250 applicants. Of those attending, many very qualified applicants passed both phases of the testing. The next step will be oral interviews by the departments.

September 20th–Met with each Captain, Manager Vernau, and Director Grove to review each public safety division's budget submission. This is conducted annually to ensure the budget meets policy direction and fiscal limitations before submission to the Board and the Board presentation.

September 29th—Attended an emergency operation briefing at SCIC Camphill with Captain Crone by invitation of the warden. Briefings are done periodically to ensure our plan agreements are in concert with SCIC operations. Fire and EMS respond to the prison for emergency events. Our police department is responsible to assist externally, and the State Police have jurisdiction in the facility itself. Throughout the month, I attended various meetings internally and externally concerning administrative and operational topics for law enforcement, fire, emergency medical services, emergency management, and Township activities.

DEPARTMENT HEAD:

Throughout the month of September, Captain Crone attended Command and Staff meetings, a Board of Commissioners Meeting, a Department Head Meeting, a Captains' Meeting, some personnel-related meetings, a meeting with UMHC management, and a Public Safety policy planning meeting. Captain Crone also assisted Silver Spring PD with a mock PLEAC assessment.

Input was provided on various ordinances as part of the comprehensive code review.

The School Resource Officer MOU has been signed off by all parties. As such, pending budget authorization, the plan will be to get one of the current candidates into the January academy class. This will facilitate backfilling our SRO's street position and ensure an August start for the program.

Speaking of budget, diligent effort went into ensuring that Board limits were adhered to.

Captain Crone participated with a committee organized by the District Attorney to review charges requiring DA approval. This was productive and will result in a more user-friendly document to guide personnel.

Captain Crone also continued the PLEAC Standards Committee review of the program's sample assessment for revision.

Captain Crone had been requested by Fairview Township Fire Department to speak at their annual banquet. Specifically, the request was for an encore presentation of the address given to Lisburn Fire earlier in the year. The request was accommodated.

A radio interview with Jenna Clay regarding our Pink Hands of Hope No-Shave/Nifty Nails

Ofc. Stirling was the Officer of the Month for September. Ofc. Stirling is the OIC on his platoon, and he led the platoon in traffic stops for the month. His two most noteworthy cases for the month were a road rage incident and a reported stolen vehicle.

In the road rage incident, the suspect followed the victims from Dillsburg then into our Township where Ofc. Stirling and other officers intercepted them. The suspect was taken into custody on an outstanding warrant. Ofc. Stirling followed up with the D.A.'s office and the victims and filed charges on the suspect for Stalking and Harassment.

The reported stolen vehicle case involved a known individual, prone to mental health issues. After initial investigation led to the possibility that the vehicle may have been stolen, Ofc. Stirling continued to investigate it, and he found that it had been repossessed. Ofc. Stirling then met with the vehicle owner and took the time to assist him with contacting the bank. Ofc. Stirling wrote down the steps that needed to be taken to get the car back. He also contacted the company that provides care for this individual and explained to them what needed to be done to get the car. Ofc. Stirling's efforts went above and beyond what some officers would do.



The following is written documentation of work completed by me during the month of September 2022.

During the month of September 2022, I addressed issues involving video and video recordings for court appearances. During the month I made videos for use from the Watchguard System, (some as many as 7 videos a day), and for the eDiscovery system. Videos sent to the district attorney's office, sent to individual officers, or placed into e-Discovery. All videos were successfully uploaded to the system required.

On 08 September, 2022, Lieutenant Foltz and I used the new prisoner transport van to pick up four (4) prisoners from Cumberland County Prison for court. The van was used sparingly since the purchase due to the rise of the COVID crisis. We helped/assisted officers by picking up all prisoner's requested in one transport trip. Van worked well with no issues.

During the month of September I helped to address or addressed many vehicle maintainence issues. We had several cars go down with flat or damaged tires. These issues were all repaired or replaced. We also had other mechanical issues with cars and these were also addressed. Highway Maintenance department arranged the repair of or repaired numerous vehicles. The issues ranged from recall issues to engine problems.

During the month of September, the third quarter Evidence Inspection was completed with no issues or problems experienced. Over 200 items of evidence were checked and all were present and accounted for in the inventory. Inspection ranged all over the evidence room and multiple bins and/or locations were checked in the main evidence lab, secured evidence, as well as in the drug room. All evidence was acconted for in this inspection.

CALEA/PLEAC prep was started this month. This consisted of a meeting between Julie Echterling, Captain Crone, and myself to get started on the outstanding items for the pending evaluation. WE met and discussed the proofs that will need to be addressed and planned out who will accomplish each task. These tasks will be accomplished prior to 15 October 2022.

For the month of September I had one court appearance scheduled for 15 September 2022. I appeared as directed for the hearing on the 2017 case. The defendant failed to appear for court as directed and I was later informed she called in to request a continuance. The continuance was granted by Judge Delozier and new court date was set for early October.

For the Month of September, I was made aware of an issue with the MPS system. This is the system that allows for silent dispatch and is an alternative way for officers to receive calls for service. They are also able to use this system to run registrations and other information via PENNDOT. I was made aware of the issues with this systm and asked to fix it. I worked with computer support as well as with Cumberland County to address and fix this issue.

During the month, I entered two (2), overdose cases into ODIN. This is the system that tracks and monitors all overdose cases. I received the two cases from Patrol and entered both into the system. To this date and time, all cases from the LAPD received for overdose medical responses are entered into ODIN.

I attened a safety committee meeting on 14 September 2022. No new information received from this meeting. Addionally, I scheduled details for the Lisburn Community Park for the CSO staff. I also addressed a few evidence issues, (officers mistakes with property records), to facilitate the evidence process.

I attended and worked the Physical Training, (PT), events for the two day Cumberland County Consortium. This was held at the Carlisle High School and was scheduled for Saturday 17 and Sunday 18 September. The individual "heats" of applicants was remarkably less than was initally scheduled. No issues or problems received during the two days of the test.

Issues addressed with the portable radio of Corporal Curtis, the Body Worn Camera (BWC), of Officer Milletics, and the car equipment of Car 10 was done in the month. Radio and BWC sent back for repair. The car equipment was also worked on for several days, (issue would be fixed and then go back to needing to be repaired), until a new SIM card was ordered for the device. The device malfunctioning was the modem inside the car. Issue has not replicated since the new SIM was received.

I began preparation and started communicating with NDI and our service representatives for the initiation of the LPR expansion project. The project, which was initally scheduled to begin 26 September 2022, was pushed back to mid-October.

I set up and arranged a VASCAR/TRACKER class for officers Kell, Hughes, and Lewis for 22 October 2022. This class will be at Raybold's Service Center in Harrisburg. The class will instruct them on how to use the speed timing devices used presently by LAPD officers. All officers notified and the schedule was updated.

The above was a summary of my actions for the month of September 2022. I am certain there are some actions taken not documented in the report. Work will continue on all issues in October 2022.

In September, the Lower Allen Twp. Police Dept. (LATPD) had 1,297 dispatched calls for service from Cumberland County Communications resulting in 583 reports. Of those 583 reports, 102 were UCR related. During the month of September, LATPD made arrests or filed criminal charges on 33 individuals, issued 9 non-traffic citations, 67 traffic citations, 153 warnings, and 28 parking tickets.

There were 40 crashes reported to LATPD in September. Of those 40 crashes, 8 were reportable crashes and 32 were non-reportable crashes.







Request for Service 2015 to 2022




Monthly Request for Service 2019 and 2022


