

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The **2023 Budget** was enacted on December 12, 2022. As background, operating cost covers the day to day running of the Township, including labor, goods, and services. Capital outlays cover the acquisition of fixed assets such as land, building improvements, vehicles, etc. Debt service covers the repayment of bonds and other borrowings. The Township's main funds are the General Fund, which accounts for most day-to-day operations, Sanitation Fund that accounts for trash hauling, Fire and Fire Capital Funds that pay for certain operations of the Township's two fire companies, and Highway Aid Fund that covers certain road maintenance including road resurfacing projects.

As part of the budget process, the Board of Commissioners review the Township's long-term financial plan. A resolution in 2020 established rules for this plan by setting caps on annual spending growth, limits on tax increases, and maintenance of reserves sufficient to carry the Township through an economic recession. A year after its sunset in 2025, a bond issue will likely be needed to replace fire apparatus. (CONTINUED on page 3)

The anticipated bond will "wrap around" the expiration of old bonds issued in 2005 so that debt service will not increase. The financial plan, coupled with other actions are hoped to advance the Township's bond rating to AAA (from AA+) thus trim significant cost from any future bond issue. There is no new debt issuance planned for 2023.


The 2026 bond financing has also been discussed for road resurfacing. State liquid-fuels shared revenue has decreased an average of \$7,076 per year over the last 5 years, while paving costs have been exceeding inflation. This led to gradual reduction in annual road-miles repaved, and now to a backlog in repaving needs totaling roughly \$5 million. A professional study is in the 2023 Budget to prioritize all Township roads. Besides possible bond financing, other funding methods have been discussed including the Pennsylvania Infrastructure Bank, an annual contribution from the General Fund of about \$500,000, Community Development Block Grants for neighborhoods that qualify, and less expensive resurfacing options such as oil and chip. For now, the 2023 Budget allocates \$1,492,830 for road resurfacing in the Highway Aid Fund as part of the regular biannual resurfacing program.

Bond financing is also being considered for a fire station relocation, and an upgrade for Station 2 on Rupp Ave. These come from a professional study conducted in 2021. For 2023, though, attention is focused on attracting and retaining volunteer firefighters, including the addition of a 12-month volunteer recruitment consultant.

History also affected the budget. Financially speaking, it was a bumpy ride since the end of 2019. With the negative financial impact of 2020 COVID restrictions, it was then worried that reserves would be running low by 2022. As mentioned last year, 2020 was saved from a deficit by grant-related inflows. Fortunately, revenue improved in 2021 and normalized for 2022. On the outgoing side, 2022's inflationary spending-power erosion proved challenging because most departments were limited by spending-growth caps to under 2022's anticipated inflation rate of 8.0%. Still, the 2023 Budget stayed within the spending caps without deferring needed maintenance. The 2024 Budget process will also be challenging if high inflation continues.

The American Rescue Plan Act provided the Township with \$2,127,303 in 2021 and 2022, of which all but 250,000 (which was spent in 2022) is budgeted in 2023. It will be used for radios, rooftop HVAC outlays (mentioned below) as well as for digitizing the records of the Community and Economic Development Department, plus several smaller outlays.

The largest new 2023 expenditure is for radio replacements coordinated by Cumberland County and budgeted for \$1,682,220. At the time of this writing, the County was not certain of the price or the timing for the purchase, so details are likely to change. Not completed in 2022 due to supplychain problems were the Township building rooftop HVAC units These are now being completed in 2023. Other capital outlays include a replacement street sweeper (\$320,000, funded by the Lower Allen Township Stormwater Authority), a replacement dump truck (\$255,000), parking lot paving at the Lower Allen Community Park (\$160,000), an emergency generator (\$120,000) and a replacement fuel pump system (\$50,000) for the Public Works building, plus several smaller outlays, including a flashing pedestrian crossing beacon at Wesley and Royal Drive.


Another project postponed from 2022 due to supply chain problems was the installation of a 1,080-kW solar photovoltaic electric generation system, which is anticipated to accommodate most Township power needs. Tax advantages for the installer require them to own the system for the first 5 years, after which the Township will make debt service payments for 30 years. The net cash gain due to utility savings is anticipated to be \$2,535,430 over the life of the panels.

Budgeted labor hours increased by 8,566 to 210,308. New for 2023 is a full-time police officer to replace an existing patrolman who will become a school resource officer serving West Shore School District locations within the Township. The school resource officer begins in September with almost 75% of direct costs covered by the District through a Federal grant. A new full-time employee was also added to the Community and Economic Development Department. A new full-time environmental coordinator is funded jointly by the Lower Allen Township Stormwater Authority and the Sanitation Fund. A new full-time public safety officer is added midyear and funded by the Fire Operations Fund to assist with volunteer firefighter recruitment and retention needs. A full-time Finance/Human Resource position will be made part-time.

In line with the Penn Waste contract's final year, quarterly rates will increase from \$76.17 to \$79.35. There will be no increase in real estate tax or street light assessments. Sewer and stormwater assessments are governed by separate authorities. They report that stormwater assessments will not change, and that sewer assessments increase from \$79.00 to \$83.00 per quarter.

A focus on green space and economic development continues in 2023. Discussion continues for development of the Gettysburg Road corridor and low-impact improvement of the Beacon Hill Radar Site. The same holds for continued pedestrian/bike trail connectivity.

By looking at the actions of the Board of Commissioners as a whole over the last 70 years, Township staff conjectures that a consistent Township goal is to attract incoming residents and businesses whom existing residents would value as neighbors and business partners, and to enhance the Township's relative-value position. This requires an ideal mix of services delivered at "below-market" prices. То achieve that requires adherence to a long-term financial outlook emphasizing safety from crime and fire, and enhanced neighborhood and business value. Efforts in 2023 will continue with emphasis on expansion of open space for the public, and supportive improvements for our businesses.

811 SAFE DIGGING MONTH • BUILDING SAFETY MONTH



For over fifty years Pennsylvania 811's mission has been to prevent damage to underground facilities. To promote safety, we provide an efficient and effective communications network among project owners, designers, excavators, and facility owners. Since our inception in 1972, we have increased membership from 6 utilities in one county to over 3,700 underground facility owners and operators in all 67 counties. The service is available 24 hours a day, every day of the year.

The organization incorporated in 1978. The national 811 emergency number went live in 2008. Act 50 (2017) became effective on April 28, 2018, and the electronic "member mapping" service became a requirement for all members. In 2022, Pennsylvania 811 received close to 1,050,000 excavation notifications, and transmitted approximately 6.8

million notifications to their member facility owners and operators allowing essential utility and construction crews to provide vital underground services and repair to critical infrastructure to communities throughout Pennsylvania.

With the passage of the Bipartisan Infrastructure law and the Broadband Equity, Access and Deployment Program, we anticipate an increase in projects throughout Pennsylvania that will impact the construction industry as well as the underground facility owners.

We encourage everyone to get involved with promoting safe digging practices within your community. The call before you dig process helps to prevent injuries, property damages, inconvenient utility outages, and fines. Safe Digging is a shared responsibility among excavators, homeowners, facility owners, municipalities, cities and county level management and planners.

Traditionally outdoor projects start in the spring. Pennsylvania 811 Safe Digging Month serves as a reminder to all excavators and homeowners to call 811 at least 3 business days before you dig, so the approximate location of the underground utility lines can be identified and marked by facility owners.

Join us in raising the public's awareness of underground safety.

The message is simple "Call 811 Before You Dig".



MAY IS BUILDING SAFETY MONTH

May is Building Safety Month. May is the time to remember the dedicated members of the International Code Council. The Council brings together local, state and federal officials with expertise in the construction environment to create and implement the highest-quality codes in order to protect Americans from building failures. 2023 CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

The following list summarizes the Township's plan for 2023 for public works projects. Many of the projects will be completed by the Township's Public Works Department, while some projects will require contractors to perform the work.

Road and Stormwater Projects:

Lower-end of Highland Park Paving and Stormwater Project – Complete mill and overlay of Kelton, Shoreham, Norman, lower end of Kingsley, Warwick and Strafford Roads. Stormwater infrastructure replacement on Norman and Kingsley roads. Handicap ramp replacement throughout the area.

<u>Allendale Stormwater and Handicap Ramp Replacement Project</u> – Handicap ramp construction and replacement and stormwater infrastructure replacement throughout the development.

Detention Basin Retrofit Projects – five (5) detention basins will be retrofitted into bioretention facilities in the Township in conjunction with the Township's Pollution Reduction Plan for the Chesapeake Bay. The locations are as follows:

United Methodist Home for Children/Weis - 5120 Simpson Ferry Road

EMS: AN IMPORTANT WORD ON FALLS AND FALL PREVENTION



In 2022 falls were the leading cause of injury in Lower Allen Township. Lower Allen Township EMS responded to 513 falls in 2022. In the United States falls are the leading cause of fatal and non-fatal injuries in Americans 65-years of age and older.

The majority of falls occur in the home. The natural desire of people as they age is to maintain their independence and remain in their home. Remaining active and independent improves overall health and well-being. Fall prevention is a key element in ensuring independence. Reducing falls improves your personal safety and helps to build a safer community.

Here are some tips to help reduce falls and improve your personal safety and safety of your family:

- 1. Clean-up. Remove common trip hazards from stairs and hallways such as shoes, clothing, books, and boxes. Neatness counts.
- 2. **Tripping hazards**. Remove or repair tripping hazards such as loose carpets and uneven floors. Fix slippery floors and staircases.
- 3. **Handrails and grab bars**. Repair any loose handrails on inside and outside staircases. Install handrails and grab bars anyplace there is change in elevation and in bathtubs and showers.
- 4. Avoid loose clothing. Loose clothing increases your chances of falling by becoming unexpectedly caught or getting tangled in your feet. Wear comfortable properly fitting clothing.
- 5. Lighting. Install proper lighting in all areas to reduce shadows and improve visibility.
- 6. Wear shoes. Avoid socks on slippery floors. Nonslip socks are also an option.
- 7. **Make it nonslip**. Bathtubs and showers are extreme slip hazards. Reduce the hazard by purchasing nonslip mats. Grab rails also help reduce falls.
- 8. Live on one level. Reduce the risk of falls involving stairs by living on one level.
- 9. **Move carefully**. Be careful and allow your body to adjust. As you age it takes time for your body adjust when moving from lying down to sitting and sitting to standing. When changing positions pause for a minute and allow your body to adjust.
- 10. Use your tools. If you are supposed to be using a cane, walker of other device to assist you in walking, always use what you have been given. Proper use reduces your risk of falling.
- 11. **Exercise.** Exercise programs are a common insurance benefit. Use the benefit and take advantage of structured programs to keep your strength and stamina up to reduce your risk of falling.

Tis the Season to Cut the Grass

As the weather warms and the Spring flowers begin to bloom, so does the grass begin to grow in our yards.

Are you a bagger or a mulcher? Suffice to say that our lawns can be our pride and joy or the bane of our existence. Whether you enjoy mowing or you despise it, deciding what to do with the grass clippings is a decision we all need to make each year. The environmentally friendly decision would be to mulch the clippings back into the yard. Bagging the clippings is a choice that can lead to increased trash each week. That increase in trash leads to more waste in the landfills. Consider alternative options when sprucing up your yard this summer. Maybe the new option could save you valuable time to be spent with your loved ones or pursuing new hobbies.

Safety First

Grass clippings that are blown into the street can be a hazard to cars, motorcycles, and bicycles. Fresh grass clippings in the road can be just as slippery as ice in the winter. The main component in grass is water, whether the grass clippings are wet or dry they still cause dangerous road conditions.


Keep Away From the Drain

Grass clippings contain Nitrogen, Phosphorous, and other elements that can cause harmful effects to water supplies. When grass clippings are blown into the street they can end up in the local waterways causing adverse effects to the stream habitats. Grass clippings can also contaminate waterways with chemicals from lawn maintenance. Pesticides and fertilizers can also cause a negative impact on localChesapeake Bay Waterways.

Consider Other Uses

In addition to grass clippings in the street looking messy and being an eye sore, consider alternative uses for them. Grass clippings can be beneficial mulch for your yard by providing Nitrogen back to the soil and protecting the yard from drought. Also, grass clippings can be used for a base in flower beds or can be used to feed animals.





Basin Retrofit Progression

Lower Allen Township will be retrofitting several detention basins into bioretention facilities in 2023 as part of our Pollution Reduction Plan with the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP). These projects will reduce pollutants that reach the Susquehanna River and ultimately the Chesapeak Bay.

Over our last PADEP NPDES permit cycle, Lower Allen Township has been retrofitting detention basins into bioretention facilities to reduce pollutants entering our stormwater system that eventually make their way to the Susquehanna River. These projects, along with additional permit requirements, are obligations of our PADEP NPDES permit. Basin retrofit projects have already been completed at our Public Works Facility, Sheepford Crossing East and Sheepford Crossing West, and in the Moreland and Beacon Hill Communities. The 2023 basin retrofit projects are located on private property but will be maintained in perpetuity by the Township. Information regarding the construction and completion of the basins can be found on the Township website, on the Township Facebook page, and by using the QR code on the right side of this article.

Where Will the New Basins be Located?

Basin retrofits will take place across the Township in 2023. Locations will include Westport Business Center, Rossmoyne Business Center, BJ's Wholesale Club Basin, Weis Market/United Methodist Home for Children, and Bethany Village West. The area of stormwater drainage for all 5 basins is 297.934 acres. The total sediment reduction for the 5 basins to be retrofitted is 239.099.9 pounds/year, the equivalent of 17 African Elephants. All 5 basins are located in the Cedar Run Watershed of the Chesapeake Bay Watershed. The Township will maintain these basins and the previously retrofitted basins in perpetuity. Lower Allen Township appreciates the cooperation of the property owners that have worked hard to review and collaborate on the agreements to complete these basin projects.

LAWN MULCHING FACTS:

The great debate with mulching continues in every neighborhood. Mulching can have many benefits for your lawn:

- decreases evaporation rates by as much as 35%
- protects plants from sun and wind
- prevents weeds from germinating
- insulates roots from temperature changes
- provides much needed organic matter to promote healthy growth in the future
- prevents soil erosion





Are you team bag or team mulch?

If you choose to bag your grass, how many bags do you have out for trash? Where do all those bags of grass clipping go? Landfill space is at a premium currently as it is. Continuing to bag your grass and place it out for trash is only decreasing the space in a landfill at a faster rate. How often do you mow your grass? Sources who recommend mulching suggest mowing your lawn no more than once a week. Mulching more often than once a week can damage the grass. A myth about mulching, it does not cause thatch build up. A typical lawn requires 4 pounds of Nitrogen per year for healthy growth. Mulching can provide as much as 1 pound of the needed Nitrogen, as well as providing nutrients to the microorganisms in the food web. If the soil nutrients aren't enough of a benefit for you, think of all that energy you could be saving for other projects by mulching!

3 REASONS TO RECYCLE YARD WASTE

Create Food For the Soil Using your yellow Lower Allen Township bin for your yard waste pick up will allow your yard to remain clean while providing yourself and other residents with nutrient rich compost. Compost that is added back into soil allows for water retention and reduces the need for Nitrogen fertilizers.

Control Erosion

Composting and adding compost allows the soil to act as a sponge to retain water, in turn reducing erosion.

Simplify Your Clean Up

Tree branches, bush trimmings and tree stumps up to 14" are all considered yard waste and can be dropped off at the Public Works Eacility





Do You Have A Yellow Bin?

Yellow yard waste bins are available for every residence in Lower Allen Township at the Municipal Services Building on Gettysburg Road. The yellow yard waste bins allow residents to compost their yard waste for weekly collection, reducing the amount of trash that is collected curbside. According to the Environmental Protection Agency, if all yard clippings were composted by either curbside pick-up or mulching back into the yard, approximately 33 million pounds of organic waste would be kept out of landfills. Yard waste can be dropped off at the Public Works Facility between 7 am and 3 pm Monday through Friday and the second Saturday of the month from April to November. Curbside collection of the yellow bins resumes in April. If you find yourself searching for more ways to recycle or compost at your residence, reach out to the Lower Allen Township Environmental Coordinator to discuss a waste analysis.



Cumberland County Vector Control is Gearing Up for Another Year

As the winter months wind down, Cumberland County Vector Control is gearing up for the 2023 West Nile and Tick Season seasons. The spring so far has been very wet, making it easy to see where water is laying. So, it's a good time to prepare yourselves for the warmer weather by clearing your yard of any standing water; this includes any buckets, toys, or rain barrels that could be holding water for more than a week.

You should also get a repellent that you feel comfortable with using, and wear longer sleeved clothes that are lighter



in color when possible. This will help stop mosquito bites on your arms, as well as help with finding any ticks that try to catch a ride on your clothing.

It is also a good time to clear any thin or remove any thicker bushes or leaf piles you may have around your yard. Mosquitoes love to hang out in thicker, shade vegetation like ivy or shrubs, and ticks love to stay in the leaf litter that piles up on the ground.

West Shore Elks Donation

On February 22nd, the Township received notice from the West Shore Elks Lodge #2257 (Camp Hill) that Lower Allen Township was the recipient of a \$1,500 Community Investment donation. These funds will be used to purchase iPads for field use by Lower Allen Public Safety Officers.

TAX OFFICE · SANITARY SEWER SERVICE & BILLS

It's time to spring into action if you haven't already! The 2023 Lower Allen Township and Cumberland County Real Estate Tax bills were mailed early this year and should have been received by Tuesday, February 21st. If you haven't received your tax bill, please contact Bonnie Miller, Tax Collector at <u>bmiller@latwp.org</u> or call (717) 763-7960.

Due to the constant reselling of mortgages and frequent refinancings, we mail all real estate tax bills to the property owner. If your taxes are in an escrow account, we ask that you write your loan number on the tax bill and promptly forward one copy to your bank or mortgage company so that they can pay your real estate taxes during the discount period. Currently, Wells Fargo is the only mortgage company that has requested that they not be sent a copy of your tax bill.

Spring Bargains for Seniors - Property Tax Rebate (PA-1000) - Rebates are offered to Pennsylvanians age 65 and older who are homeowners and total income from all sources is less than \$35,000 (including ½ of your social security). If you are a senior age 65 and older and are renting, your total income must be less than \$15,000 from all sources (including ½ of your social security). Funds for the tax rebates come from the Pennsylvania State Lottery. Forms are available online, from your tax preparer, or from your State Representatives Sheryl Delozier or Thomas Kutz.

TAX OFFICE HOURS: The tax office remains closed due to my personal health. I can be reached via email at bmiller@latwp.org or by phone at (717) 763-7960. Please mail your payment or place payment in the gray deposit box adjacent to the flagpole at the Municipal Services Center (MSC). If you would like a paid receipt for your taxes, PLEASE include both copies of your tax bills along with a self-addressed stamped envelope, so I can mail your receipt back to you.

Some residents may not be aware that the Lower Allen Township Sewer Authority personnel are not located at the Lower Allen Township Municipal Services Center (MSC). Sewer Authority operations are based at the sewer treatment plant location on Limekiln Road. To either discuss the sewer portion of your combined utility bill, or to request that the sewer main line be examined for a possible blockage, you will need to call the Sewer Authority directly at (717)-774-0610. If you are experiencing a possible sewer blockage issue, please contact the Sewer Authority immediately as the sewer treatment plant is staffed 24/7.

The Sewer Authority mails delinquent notices on gold-colored paper at least four (4) times a year. If you receive a delinquent notice, please considering calling the Authority to setup a payment plan to avoid additional fees being added to your sewer account. When paying your delinquent sewer balance, please enclose the bottom portion of the delinquent notice and write "Sewer Only" on the memo line of your check. If "Sewer Only" is not specified, the payment could inadvertently be posted to another utility service or divided among all utilities on your combined utility bill.

Property owners with a delinquent sanitary sewer account and not adhering to a payment plan are subject to receiving a Sewer Municipal Property Lien. The lien process can add an additional \$412.50 in initial lien fees and the account will be charged for any additional legal fees. If the account continues to remain unpaid, the Authority's next form of collection action could result in a Water Service Termination; and without water service to the property, the property could be deemed uninhabitable.

As a reminder, the cost of collection action is always added to the sewer billing account. Therefore, if you have a delinquent sewer account, please call the Authority as soon as possible to discuss a payment plan.


