## Pennsylvania Governor's Award for Environmental Excellence

Lower Allen Township was selected to receive a Governor's Award for Environmental Excellence for a project initiated by the Township's Public Works Director, Rebecca Davis.

The project consisted of water sampling and analysis of the Yellow Breeches Creek and Cedar Run. Over 100 samples were collected and analyzed over a thirty day period as part of the project in addition to education and outreach measures for the sampling locations.

Thank you to the Yellow Breeches Watershed Association and the Pennsylvania State Extension for partnering with the Township on this project.

#### TAX OFFICE NEWS • LAPD PROMOTION

Happy Summer! I've had a lot going on with my health and the death of my mother so please continue to take advantage of utilizing the US Postal Service, silver drop off box by the flagpole, or the black pedestal mailbox outside my office due to my immunocompromised health condition. If you would like a receipt, PLEASE include both copies of your tax bill and a self-addressed stamped envelope.

Summer Bargains for Seniors Property Tax Rebate (PA-1000): rebates are offered to Pennsylvanians 65-years and older who are homeowners and total income from all sources is less than \$35,000 (including ½ of your social security). If you are a senior 65 and older and are renting, your total income must be less than \$15,000 from all sources (including ½ of your social security). Funds for the tax rebates come from the Pennsylvania State Lottery. Forms are available online or from your tax preparer or from your State Representative Sheryl Delozier.

Important Dates and Info to Add to Your Summer Calendar:

The last day to take advantage of the face period for your March 1<sup>st</sup>, Lower Allen Township and Cumberland County real estate tax bill is Friday, June 30th. Please remember that a 10% penalty will automatically be added on July 1<sup>st</sup>.

School real estate tax bills for the fiscal year 2023-2024 will be dated July 1<sup>st</sup> and mailed to homeowners. If there is an escrow account, it is the homeowner's responsibility to mail one (1) copy to your mortgage company. Write your loan number on the tax bill and send it to the attention of the Tax Escrow Department, keeping one (1) copy for your records.

You should have received a \$8,428 Homestead Exclusion on your July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2023 West Shore School District Real Estate tax bill, if you did not, perhaps you are a new homeowner or didn't apply for it. The next window to apply for the Homestead Exclusion is December 15, 2023 through March 1, 2024. You can obtain that form on Cumberland County's website, <a href="https://www.ccpa.net">www.ccpa.net</a>. If you take the \$8,428 Homestead Exclusion amount and multiply it by 13.5621 mils it equals \$114.31. Your assessment on your house will go back to the original assessment before the Homestead Exclusion since that only applies to the West Shore School District real estate tax bill.

#### PA GOVERNOR'S AWARD (CONTINUED) • NEW BUSINESSES

This is the first Governor's Award for **Environmental Excellence** awarded to Lower Allen Township!

The project developed a story map that was published on social media to educate Township residents on the importance of water quality, sustainability, and pollution detection and elimination. The sample analysis will allow Lower Allen Township to mitigate the pollution through installation of Best Management Practices (BMPs) throughout the watershed. Clean and healthy natural resources are required for the growth and development of our future and the protection of the Chesapeake Bay Watershed. This can be achieved on a local basis as demonstrated through this project. The Township reached out to more than 35 residents in the Yellow Breeches Watershed to discuss the sampling project with them and educated them on site during the sampling process. In addition, Lower Allen Township involved over 20 volunteers from the Pennsylvania State Extension as well as the Yellow Breeches Watershed Association to help gather the samples, perform data collection and document the process. The volunteers were educated on proper sample collection, GIS database collection, and non-point source pollution during the sampling process.

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#### FIREWORKS, YARD SIGNS, AND ROLL-OFF CONTAINERS

#### Fireworks Use Regulated

On March, 13, 2023 the Board of Commissioners enacted **Ordinance 2023-02**, which is an update to the Noise Ordinance. Section, 147-4(I), which governs the use of consumer fireworks, was amended to read:

Discharging, detonating, igniting or otherwise using consumer fireworks between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 10:00 a.m. shall be prohibited, except during the following periods, when consumer fireworks may be used until **1:00** am the following day:

- On July 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, and 4<sup>th</sup>. When July 4<sup>th</sup> falls on a Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday, consumer fireworks may be used until 1:00 a.m. on the immediately preceding and following Friday and Saturday.
- On December 31<sup>st</sup>.
- Memorial Day, including the immediately preceding Saturday and Sunday.
- Labor Day, including the immediately preceding Saturday and Sunday.

There are a few items that we see popping up alongside streets in Lower Allen Township in the Spring and also year-round: wire yards signs and trash roll-offs (and also storage PODS). What is probably unknown to most residents is that there are ordinances prohibiting these items from the public street and right-of-way (ROW).



Codified ordinance sections §220-248, Sign standards and §220-254, Temporary sign regulations prohibit the type of wire-frame yard signs you'd typically see advertising painting, roofing, invisible fences, mattresses, etc. Signs such as these can be placed on private property, but not in the street ROW. The ROW typically extends to the inside edge of the sidewalk. In areas without sidewalks, you can generally tell where the ROW ends by where telephone or electric poles are placed. Code enforcement officers who encounter these signs will pull them and bring them back to the Township building for disposal.

Code section §187-64, Temporary right-of-way obstructions, prohibits roll-off containers, storage pods, and similar containers from being placed in the street without a permit. When considering a permit application, the Township will consider such items as; can the container be placed in the driveway?

Will it present a sight-distance problem for neighbors or motorists? Will it block a stormwater inlet. If they meet criteria, they are generally permitted for a maximum of (2) two weeks.

These same restrictions are applied to trailers when they are *not* connected to a motorized vehicle. (**Section §209-29**, **Temporary parking regulations**).

Before placing any roll-offs, storage containers, or similar items on the street, contact the Township at (717) 975-7575 to see about getting a permit.

#### **BULK ITEM DISPOSAL · WOODCHIP & LEAF COMPOST**

#### **Bulk Item Disposal**

Currently our trash hauler will pick up one bulk item per week curbside. For residents' convenience, four loads of bulk items per household per calendar year can be brought to the Public Works facility. **A \$25.00 fee will be assessed for households exceeding their 4-load limit.** The business hours for dropping off items at Public Works are Monday – Friday between the hours of 7:00am – 3:00pm. For residents' convenience, the facility is open the second Saturday of the month 8:00am – 1:00pm, from April through November.

<u>Acceptable Bulk items</u> - Household appliances, furniture, carpet, and wooden items - (outdoor furniture, swings, and landscaping timbers), tire rims (without tires), metal, railroad ties, motors and lawn mowers will be accepted and must have the oil and gas and tires removed before disposal.

<u>Not acceptable items</u> - Shingles, concrete, rocks, bricks, tree stumps, dirt, paint, tires, oil, fuel, glass, pressurized tanks, TVs, and Computer Equipment <u>WILL NOT</u> be accepted.

#### Woodchips and Leaf Compost Delivery/Pick-up

Woodchips and leaf compost are available to Township residents for delivery or pick up at the Public Works facility. Deliveries are made on Thursday or Friday mornings, April through early November. Public Works staff will load woodchips and leaf compost for you when they are available to assist.

Deliveries will be made on a prepay-basis. Payments must be made at the Municipal Services Center (MSC) prior to establishing a delivery date. Getting around shouldn't be a challenge! Whether you want to run errands, attend medical appointments, join recreational activities, or visit friends, there's an easy way to get there: book a Shared Ride with rabbittransit.

Unlike a scheduled bus route that only operates in one area, Shared Ride (a.k.a. Paratransit) provides consolidated trips between travel origins and destinations during limited hours and specific areas.

All Paratransit trips require a reservation, made no later than 12:00 p.m. the business day before your ride. Reservations may be made two (2) weeks in advance. For trips on Saturday, Sunday or Monday, reservations must be submitted by 12 p.m. the Friday before. Visit <a href="www.rabbittransit.org">www.rabbittransit.org</a> > Shared Ride > Reservations to schedule a reservation.

When making a reservation for Shared Ride, it's essential to plan accordingly since the service accommodates other passengers' travel plans. Riders are grouped together based on their travel time and location(s). Travel times may be shorter or longer, depending on the total number of riders at the time. While ride times may vary, Shared Ride is a reliable and safe transportation option that can give you peace of mind when accessing life-sustaining services.

If Shared Ride sounds like a fit for you, the first step is to submit an application to the program you'd like to participate in. Shared Ride programs vary from Senior Shared Ride to the Medical Assistance Transportation Program (MATP), ADA Complementary Paratransit Program (ADA), or Paratransit Full Fare. ### Working at the Car Wash...

There are more and more carwashes popping up in the area. Did you know that a car wash has a positive environmental impact on a community, more so than washing your vehicle at home.

Did you know, washing your vehicle at a car wash can save at least 50% of the water that you would use to wash that same vehicle at home? A car wash uses approximately 45 gallons of water per wash. that same car wash can reuse that water for another vehicle. There are over 100,000 car washes in the United States. Environmentally friendly car washes are popping up all over the United States. An environmentally friendly car wash could be capturing and reusing water, using biodegradable cleaning products, or even using a waterless cleaning system.

#### **Environmental Impacts**

- The amount of water used by hand washing a car at home can be 80-140 gallons of water.
- Car washes can be required to recycle their water.
- Even if water is not recycled, the car wash is required to dispose of used water in the sewer system and not in the storm drains.
- Washing your car in the street or anywhere that the water goes to a storm drain is placing all those contaminants directly into the Chesapeake Bay.
- Vehicles often have pollen, zinc from tires, copper from brake pads, motor oil and gasoline along with other heavy metals picked up from roadways.

- Check with your municipality. Only put in the recycling toter what can be recycled by the hauler curbside.
- Be aware of any product changes. Manufacturers can change the packaging that will eliminate it from the recycling bin. That item you have recycled for years is now not able to be recycled.
- Check with your municipality's environmental coordinator to discuss options to recycle items that can not be taken curbside.

The yellow dot decal provided in the program kit is placed in the lower left corner of the vehicle's rear window. The top of the sticker should be no higher than 3.5 inches from the bottom of the window. This decal alerts first responders that vital information can be found in the vehicle.
