2024 CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

The following list summarized the Township's plan for 2024 for public works projects. Some of the projects will be completed by Township staff, while other projects will require contractors to perform the work.

ROAD AND STORMWATER PROJECTS:

Allendale Paving Project - Complete mill and overlay of the following roads:

Briarwood Court - All: Cricket Lane to End

Glenside Lane - All: Winding Way to End

Chimney Lane - All: Deerfield Road to Allendale Way

Ivy Lane - All: Deerfield Road to Blacklatch Lane

Cricket Lane - All: Deerfield Road to Deerfield Road Winding Way - All: Blacksmith Road to Creekwood Drive

<u>Highland Estates Stormwater and Handicap Ramp Replacement Project</u> – Handicap ramp construction and replacement and stormwater infrastructure replacement throughout the development.

<u>Detention Basin Retrofit Projects</u> – Three detention basins will be retrofitted into bioretention facilities in the Township in conjunction with the Township's Pollution Reduction Plan for the Chesapeake Bay at the following locations:

- Bethany Village West 5225 Wilson Lane
- United Methodist Home For Children/Weis 5120 Simpson Ferry Road
- BJs Wholesale Club 3805 Hartzdale Drive

<u>Stormwater Television Work</u> – The Township will have stormwater lines and associated infrastructure televised to determine repair and/or replacement in various locations throughout the Township.

<u>GIS</u> – Township staff is performing asset management on the Township's stormwater system. This includes verifying sizes of existing inlets, inspecting their condition, and mapping new inlets.

TRAFFIC PROJECTS:

Carlisle and Center Road Signal: Replacement of traffic signal, poles, and associated pavement markings and crosswalks at Carlisle and Center Road.

18th and Hummel Pedestrian Improvements include the following:

- Installation of handicap ramps.
- Installation of piano key crosswalk markings for greater visibility.

Wesley and Royal Pedestrian Improvements include the following:

- Pedestals with pedestrian push buttons will be placed at both sides of the crosswalks crossing Wesley.
- Crosswalks will be painted with a piano key pavement marking for improved visibility.
- Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFBs) along with pedestrian crossing signs on both sides of Wesley.
- An overhead flashing beacon mounted on a mast arm will also be constructed.

PARK PROJECTS:

Highland Park:

• Resurfacing of the tennis court and sidewalk installation.

Lower Allen Community Park:

- Parking lot paving in several areas of the park
- Invasive species removal in various locations throughout the park
- Repair and paint the storage shed located next to the Barn
- Install a new entrance sign
- Grading and drainage work on Field 2

Peter's Field Park:

- Remove the existing basketball poles and replace with two new poles
- Construct a new storage shed behind for the baseball field



Lower Allen Township was recently awarded a grant from Susquehanna River Basin Commission to provide a stormwater workshop to students attending West Shore Recreation Summer Program in 2024. The grant covers a new enviroscape (water model) for the township, equipment for the program to students, and the rental of canoes to take the students on a field trip along the Yellow Breeches Creek. Students will be joined by their own chaperones from West Shore Recreation Summer Program along with volunteers from Yellow Breeches Watershed Association who will assist with water safety instruction along the Yellow Breeches Creek.

Recycling Updates

Reduction in our waste stream and how much trash we are producing is something that all residents should be thinking about with the changes in the new refuse contract and with the publication of the Cumberland County Municipal Waste Management Plan. Lower Allen Township has added additional recycling opportunities to the Township to reduce residents waste streams. Consider utilizing one or all of these opportunities and look for more opportunities for the Township in the future.

♦ Electronics Recycling Event—March 23, 2024 9 AM to 12 PM Public Works Facility

Built into the refuse contract is a requirement for the hauler to provide 1 special event collection per year of the contract. In 2024, the special collection is an electronics event with 1 TV or monitor free per household.. ID required. Other items will be collected at no cost. Please refer to www.latwp.org for more information.

♦ Cardboard Dumpster Drop Location LACP

Cardboard can quickly become contaminated in curbside recycling containers. Wetness, grease, or food are a few of the ways that cardboard can become contaminated and lose value in the recycling process. Flattened corrugated carboard can be taken to the Lower Allen Community Park for disposal. The cardboard dumpster is located in the first parking lot on the left at the far end from the barn. Please be mindful of which dumpster you are using and place your cardboard in the appropriate dumpster.

Recycling Programs Drop Site —2233 Gettysburg Road

Lower Allen Township is a drop location for 2 different products to be recycled. The first is Bimbo Bakeries USA bread and bakery bags. The corporate office of Bimbo Bakeries sponsors this recycling program and offers free recycling for their many bakery items. Drop your empty (free of all crumbs) bakery bags at designated drop locations at the Township office. The second is for air care products and packaging of all brands. Find the drop location at the Township building for clean, empty air and home care bottles, trigger heads, lids, plugs, and cartridges. Coming Soon!! Paperboard Dumpster Drop location LACP

Cereal boxes, cracker boxes, boxes from cases of soda, pasta boxes and so many more items are made from paperboard. All of these items and many more are completely recyclable...BUT NOT IN OUR CURBSIDE CONTAINERS! Unfortunately, just like corrugated cardboard, the contamination rate is extremely high for these items and they are unable to complete the recycling process when placed in a curbside container. Using a dumpster drop site allows for reduction in the residue rates and an increase in recycling.

APRIL IS NATIONAL SAFE DIGGING MONTH AND . . .



For over fifty-two years Pennsylvania 811's mission has been to prevent damage to underground facilities. To promote safety, we provide an efficient and effective communications network among project owners, designers, excavators, and facility owners. Since our inception in 1972, we have increased membership from 6 utilities in one county to over 3,700 underground facility owners and operators in all 67 counties. The service is available 24 hours a day, every day of the year.

The organization incorporated in 1978. The national 811 emergency number went live in 2008. Act 50 (2017) became effective on April 28, 2018, and the electronic "member mapping" service

became a requirement for all members. In 2023, Pennsylvania 811 received close to 1,050,000 excavation notifications, and transmitted approximately 6.8 million notifications to their member facility owners and operators allowing essential utility and construction crews to provide vital underground services and repair to critical infrastructure to communities throughout Pennsylvania.

With the passage of the Bipartisan Infrastructure law and the Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment Program, we anticipate an increase in projects throughout Pennsylvania that will impact the construction industry as well as the underground facility owners.

We encourage everyone to get involved with promoting safe digging practices within your community. The call before you dig process helps to prevent injuries, property damage, inconvenient utility outages, and fines. Safe Digging is a shared responsibility among excavators, homeowners, facility owners, municipalities, cities and county level management and planners.

Traditionally outdoor projects start in the spring. Pennsylvania 811 Safe Digging Month serves as a reminder to all excavators and homeowners to call 811 at least 3 business days before you dig, so the approximate location of the underground utility lines can be identified and marked by facility owners.

Join us in raising the public's awareness of underground safety.

The message is simple "Call 811 Before You Dig".

MAY IS BUILDING SAFETY MONTH

This May marks the 44th Annual Building Safety Month by the International Code Council to raise awareness about building safety. Lower Allen Township is proud to observe Building Safety Month in May and to help raise awareness for the dedicated members of the International Code Council. The building inspectors of Lower Allen Township utilize the codes created by the Council to help prevent disasters such as fires, destruction from weather-related events and structural collapses. These codes are the most widely adopted building safety, energy and fire prevention codes in the nation, including the PA Uniform Construction Code.

LOWER ALLEN EMS: SPRING SAFETY TIPS FOR BEES AND TICKS



The Spring Equinox signifying the start of spring is Tuesday, March 19, 2024. Spring is a time of rejuvenation and new beginnings. The new life of spring also brings with it several hazards that can interfere with planned activities and our enjoyment of the season. Two common spring hazards are bees and ticks.

Bees are essential to our ecosystem because they pollinate crops, fruit trees, flowers, and countless other plants. Pennsylvania has at least 437 native bee species. A common bee in Pennsylvania is the Eastern Bumble Bee. The Eastern Bumble Bee lives in colonies of 100 to 2,000 workers and are usually not aggressive, but they will defend their hive.

Here are some easy bee prevention and survival tips from HealthyMePa (www.healthymepa.com):

- ♦ Bees are attracted to sweet scents, so avoid wearing flowery perfumes or leaving sugary food out.
- ♦ When drinking sweet beverages outside, check cans and straws for insects before drinking.
- Guard your face and neck, the most common places for bees to sting.
- ♦ If you are stung, apply hydrocortisone cream to ease itching or stinging sensation.
- ♦ Leave the immediate area, because bee stings release a chemical that attracts other bees to the scene.
- ◆ Scrape a bee stinger off with a fingernail or dull object—do not pull-out using tweezers.
- ♦ If a swarm is attacking, rather than trying to swat them away, get into a closed area, "play dead," or dive into water.

If you have experienced allergic reactions **ALWAYS** have your EpiPen with you!

Ticks are dangerous to people and pets. The primary risk is Lyme disease with Pennsylvania constantly ranking near to top of list for cases of Lyme Disease. There are four (4) varieties of ticks in Pennsylvania. Only one type, the black legged or deer tick, carries Lyme disease and less than half of those are actual carriers of Lyme disease. In most cases Lyme disease can be resolved with antibiotics, but not all cases of Lyme disease are simple illnesses. See the next page for some simple safety tips to prevent Lyme disease:

Lyme disease is a bacterial infection primarily transmitted by Ixodes ticks, also known as deer ticks or blacklegged ticks. Lyme disease affects people of all ages. The CDC notes that it is most common in children, older adults, and others such as firefighters and park rangers who work outside and have higher exposure to ticks.

Be Tick Aware

- Wear Tick Repellent:
 Repellents with DEET,
 picaridin or lemon
 eucalyptus oil are the most
 effective.
- Create a Tick-Safe Zone at Home: Prune trees, clear leaves and brush, keep deer and other wild animals out of your yard.
- Treat Pets Monthly:
 Animal fur can act like a
 "tick magnet," exposing you
 when you snuggle with your
 pet.

Check out your symptoms at www. lymedisease.org/symptomchecker for printable results you can give your doctor.

What If You Get Bitten?

- Don't squeeze, twist or squash the tick. Don't burn it with a match or cover it with Vaseline.
- Use fine-point tweezers or a special tickremoving tool. Grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible.
- Pull the tick straight out with steady, even pressure. Disinfect the bite area and wash your hands.
- Save the tick for testing (alive if possible) in a small bottle or plastic bag with a green leaf or damp piece of tissue. Label it with your name, date, site of bite and how long tick was attached.




