The Department of Public Safety continues to move forward in our mission to provide for the safest community possible through service to our residents and visitors. We are looking forward to continuing implementing a variety of outstanding programs thanks to the budget approved by the Board for 2019.

**Monday, September 2<sup>nd</sup>** – Labor Day.

**Tuesday, September 3<sup>rd</sup>** – Continued working on the Public Safety Ad Hoc Committee Final Report in the morning, plus budget preparation. In the afternoon, attended the Cumberland County Police Communications meeting where they brief the progress on the new county CAD and mentioned that 2023 is still the target year for the new radio system to be implemented.

In the evening attended the Public Safety Ad Hoc Committee meeting to review and approved the Final Report.

**Wednesday, September 4<sup>th</sup>** – Attended the Capital Area Police Exchange (CAPE) quarterly meeting of participating police departments from Cumberland and Dauphin Counties hosted at Central Penn College. In the afternoon continued drafting the Public Safety Ad Hoc Committee Report.

**Thursday, September 5<sup>th</sup>** – Attended the PA 911 Advisory Board meeting at PEMA in the morning. I serve on this Board as the representative from the PA Chiefs of Police.

Continued drafting the Ad Hoc Report in the afternoon and attended the Lisburn Fire Company meeting in the evening.

**Friday, September 6<sup>th</sup>** – Attended the Alpine fire software implementation working group meeting in the morning and then met with Capt. Deaven to work on the EMS budget submission. Continued budget submission work meeting with Capt. Wirth in the afternoon.

**Monday, September 9<sup>th</sup>** – Met with the Manger in the morning. Also met with Capt. Deaven to continue budget work.

In the afternoon attended the police supervisor's meeting, began drafting the 2020 personnel request memo to Finance, and then attended the Board meeting in the evening.

**Tuesday, September 10<sup>th</sup>** – Attended the Department Head meeting in the morning and then Cumberland County EMS Council meeting in the afternoon. Worked on finalizing the budget submission in the afternoon.

**Wednesday, September 11<sup>th</sup>** – Most of the day worked on the final budget draft for submission to Finance and then attended the 9/11 ceremony in Hampden Township at their Veteran's Memorial Park.

**Thursday, September 12<sup>th</sup>** – Attended the Charter Homers meeting at Thea and then met in the evening with Chief 24 to discuss the Lisburn budget.

**Friday, September 13<sup>th</sup>** – Attended the Alpine fire software implementation working group meeting in the morning and then the Public safety Coordination meeting after that.

**Monday, September 16<sup>th</sup>** – Continued to work on the Ad Hoc Committee Report in the morning and then attended the Turnpike weekend closure planning meeting in the afternoon.

In the evening attended the Final Recommendations meeting of the AD Hoc Committee.

**Tuesday, September 17<sup>th</sup>** – In the morning again worked on budget submission and late morning attended the Pierced Leasing Program meeting to look at fire equipment leasing options for the future.

**Wednesday, September 18<sup>th</sup>** – Attended a PELRAS discipline workshop in State College.

**Thursday, September 19<sup>th</sup>** – Participated in a paramedic interview for possible hiring, and then continued work on budgets.

**Friday, September 19<sup>th</sup>** – Attended a Directors meeting in the morning and again worked on final budget submissions.

**Monday, September 23<sup>rd</sup>** – Met with the Manager in the morning and then met with the Captain's for a working lunch.

In the evening attended the Board meeting after the new vehicle display in the front building circle.

**Tuesday, September 24<sup>th</sup>** – Attended the department head meeting in the morning and then worked on the Ad Hoc final draft in the afternoon.

**Wednesday, September 25<sup>th</sup>** – Worked on the SecureNet Project with Don Smith from PREIT at the mall. This project will provide for Mall security to have access to the Lower Allen Public Safety talk group on the county radio system to provide for direct and better communication with mall security as incidents are occurring at the mall.

**Thursday, September 26<sup>th</sup>** – Attended Coffee with a Cop at Starbucks, and then met with Bill Fox an EMS vendor in the morning. Continued working on the Ad Hoc final report in the afternoon.

**Friday, September 27<sup>th</sup>** – Continued working on the Ad Hoc final report in the morning and email the FINAL DRAFT to the Committee members in the afternoon.

**Monday, September 30<sup>th</sup>** – Attended to numerous administrative tasks in the morning and in the evening attended the Board Budget meeting for the non-Public Safety departments.

During the month of September, Captain Crone attended a police supervisors' meeting, BOC Meetings, Public Safety Ad Hoc meetings (both the meetings themselves and preparatory meetings), and Department Head meetings. Public Safety Coordination and Public Safety Captains' meetings were also attended. Coffee with a Cop was held on 9/26 and we were joined by several local K9 officers as this was also an awareness and fundraising event for K9s of Police Service, a charity that helps fund K9 programs. Budget preparation meetings continued. An after-action meeting was held with Tom Ryan of WSSD regarding a significant incident. Captain Crone presided over the September Pa Police Accreditation Coalition meeting and assisted with a mock assessment for Silver Spring Police Department. He also attended a PLEAC Standards Committee meeting. The first Business and Industry Alliance meeting was attended and appeared to be quite successful.

Captain Crone attended a seminar entitled "Constitutional Use of Force", along with Sgt. Foltz and Ofc. Tamanosky. Captain Crone also participated in Police Baton and Defensive Tactics training during this month.

Officer Bryan Rennie was selected as Patrol Officer of the Month. During the month, Ofc. Rennie attended a Vehicle Inspection Regulations class where he learned how to identify fraudulent inspection stickers. He immediately put this new knowledge to use and made arrests of three separate individuals with fraudulent inspection/emission stickers.

Ofc. Rennie also responded to a crash involving an overturned vehicle which turned out to be off the roadway over an embankment. Ofc. Rennie located the vehicle upside down in a small stream. Ofc. Rennie assisted the DUI driver out of the vehicle and up the embankment. Ofc. Rennie also assisted Ofc. Shiley with a vehicle pursuit of a DUI driver while training Ofc. Newcomer. Ofc. Rennie's actions during the stop were critical to a safe resolution.

Outside of the outstanding work done here by the officers and staff of the Lower Allen Township Police Department, officers engage in all kinds of activities that benefit the community, be it coaching, volunteering, or other such endeavors. Recently, Officer Tim Cox participated in the noble work of rescuing victims of human trafficking. Working with authorities and a volunteer group, Cox twice travelled to foreign lands with this group and was able to free numerous victims of human trafficking and slavery. This was done off-duty, at his own expense, and is a testament to his dedication to work against the evils of this world.

### **NALOXONE**

Unfortunately, the streak of months with no Naloxone administrations has ended. There was one Naloxone administration by police personnel this month.

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The continual evaluation of all aspects of the EMS Division is ongoing. The emphasis is on Safety, Teamwork and Integration within the Public Safety Department. Everyone's support is greatly appreciated! In September, the operational capabilities of EMS were expended with the delivery of the new Ambulance and the re-purposing of the Captains vehicle.

Staff completed re-purposing the Captains vehicle and transforming it into a licensed EMS response vehicle. The vehicle passed inspection by the Emergency Health Services Federation on Thursday September 12, 2019. The vehicle is now available to be used as a Quick Response vehicle, Basic Life Support Response vehicle and Advanced Life Support Response vehicle. This increases system flexibility and the ability to deliver the highest quality service to the citizens of Lower Allen Township.

On Friday September 13, 2019, the new Ambulance was delivered. The ambulance is a great addition to the fleet and replaced an aging unit, which was costly, and inefficient to operate. The new ambulance improves operational efficiency. Staff worked hard to transfer all equipment from the old ambulance and set-up the new ambulance to maximize efficiency. The new ambulance passed inspection by the Emergency Health Services Federation on Thursday September 19, 2019.

A blended driver-training program was developed using industry best practices including an over the road competency evaluation. Training began on Tuesday September 24, 2019. The target date for training to be completed and the new ambulance to be placed in service is Monday October 7, 2019.

The training for the new ambulance includes implementation of new safety procedures. Examples include mandatory use of a spotter when backing, mandatory daylight headlight usage, posted speed limit compliance, and re-enforcement of existing procedures such as mandatory seatbelt usage.

The ability to successfully re-purpose the Captains vehicle and placing the new ambulance in service in a timely and efficient manner would not have been possible without the cooperation and support of the Township, the extraordinary efforts of Fleet Maintenance and the incredible teamwork of the LATEMS staff.

The use of technology and operational efficiency was expanded with the successful implementation of iPads for patient care documentation and data collection. The iPads provide the staff with increased resources such as Alpine, on-line treatment protocols and medication information. Successful implementation of the iPads required review of insurance compliance issues from finance. The cooperation and support to ensure compliance was achieved during the transition from the fiancé department is greatly appreciated.

Expanded use of existing technological resources such as PowerDMS, Guardian, PlanIT and ESO continue to be developed and leveraged to improve efficiency and effectiveness.

Recruitment and interviews continued in September for Part-time Paramedics and EMT's with several highly qualified candidates in the process.

The schedule continues to be successfully managed in a positive direction aimed at reducing the need for outside assistance. The staff has done an excellent job in covering the openings. The staff's hard work and dedication are commendable and greatly appreciated.

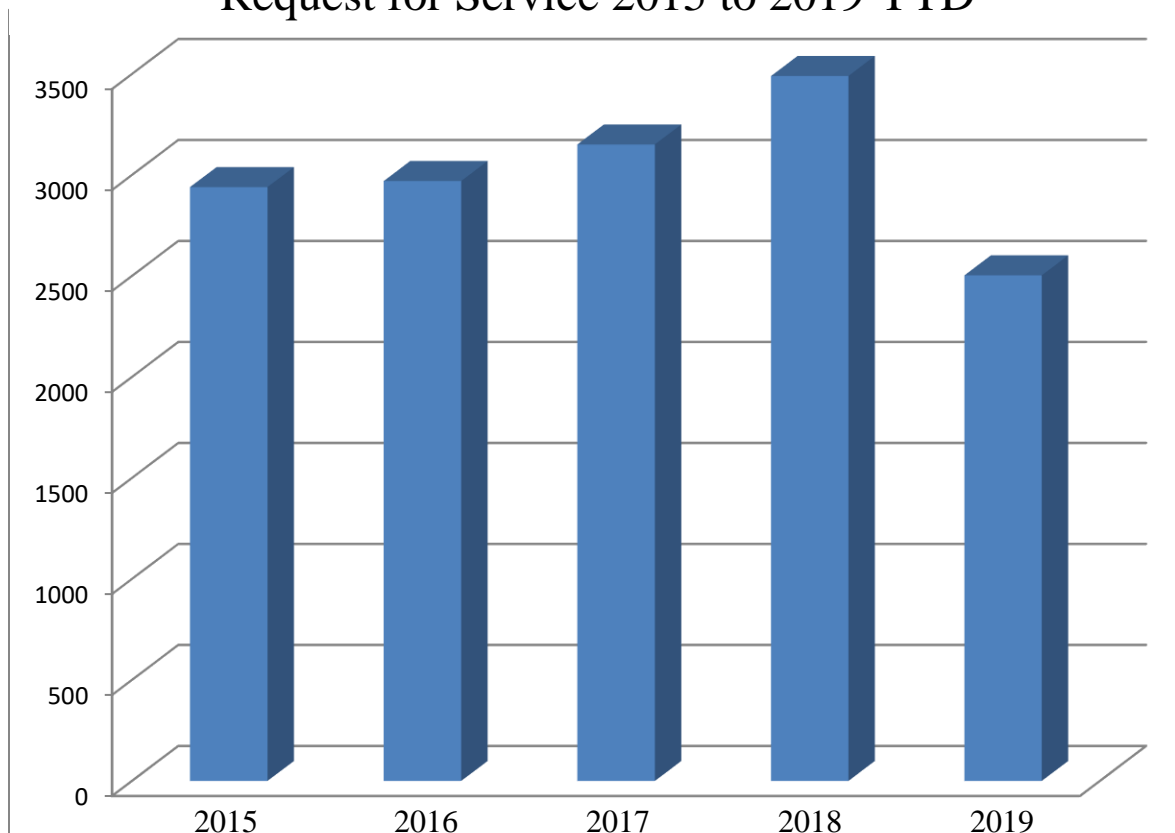

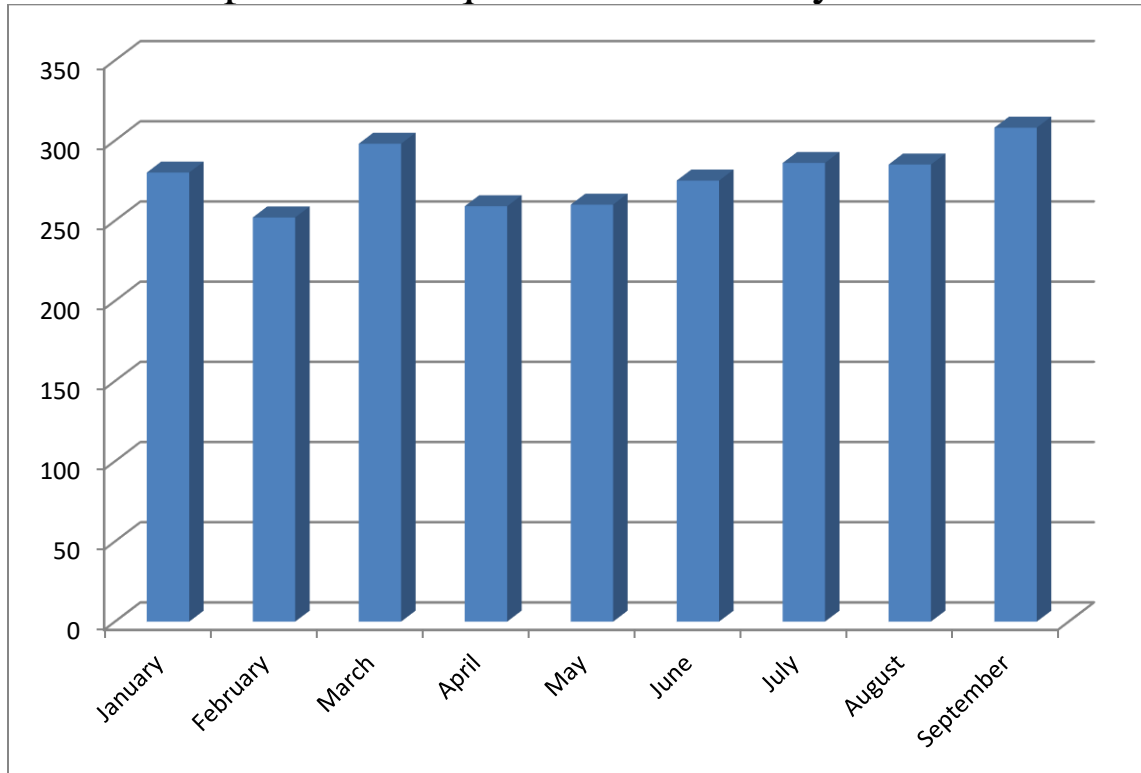

**Request for Service 2015 to 2019 YTD**

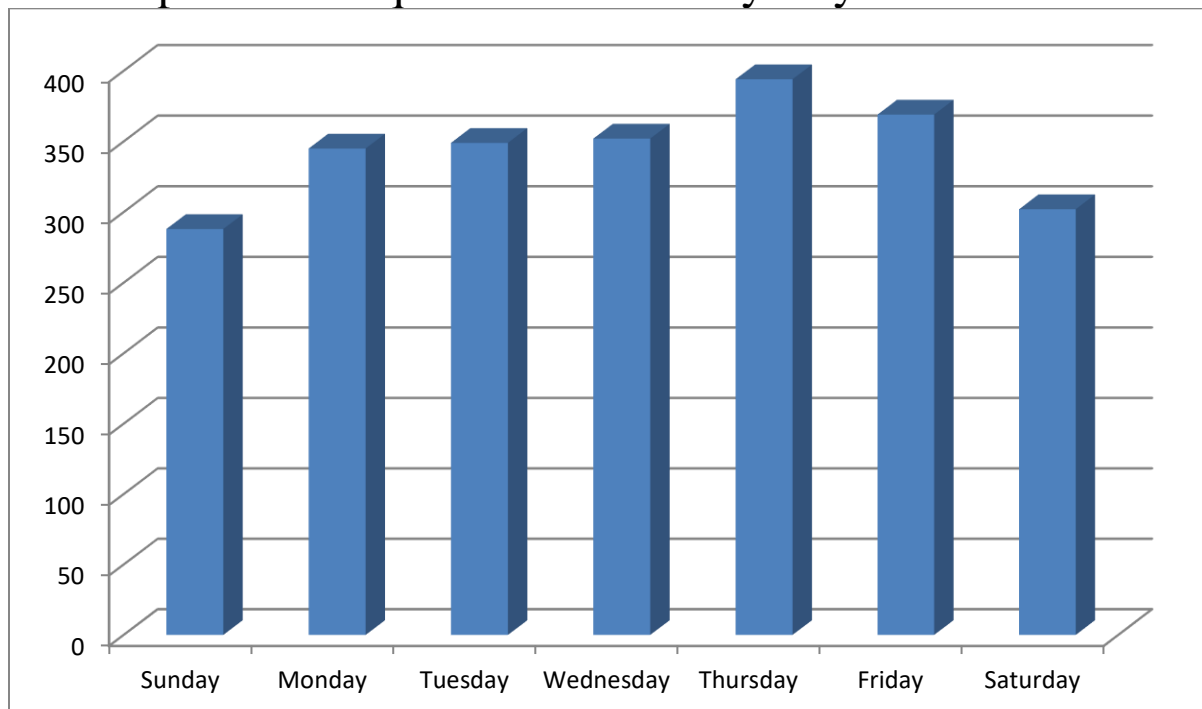

**September-Request for Service by Month**

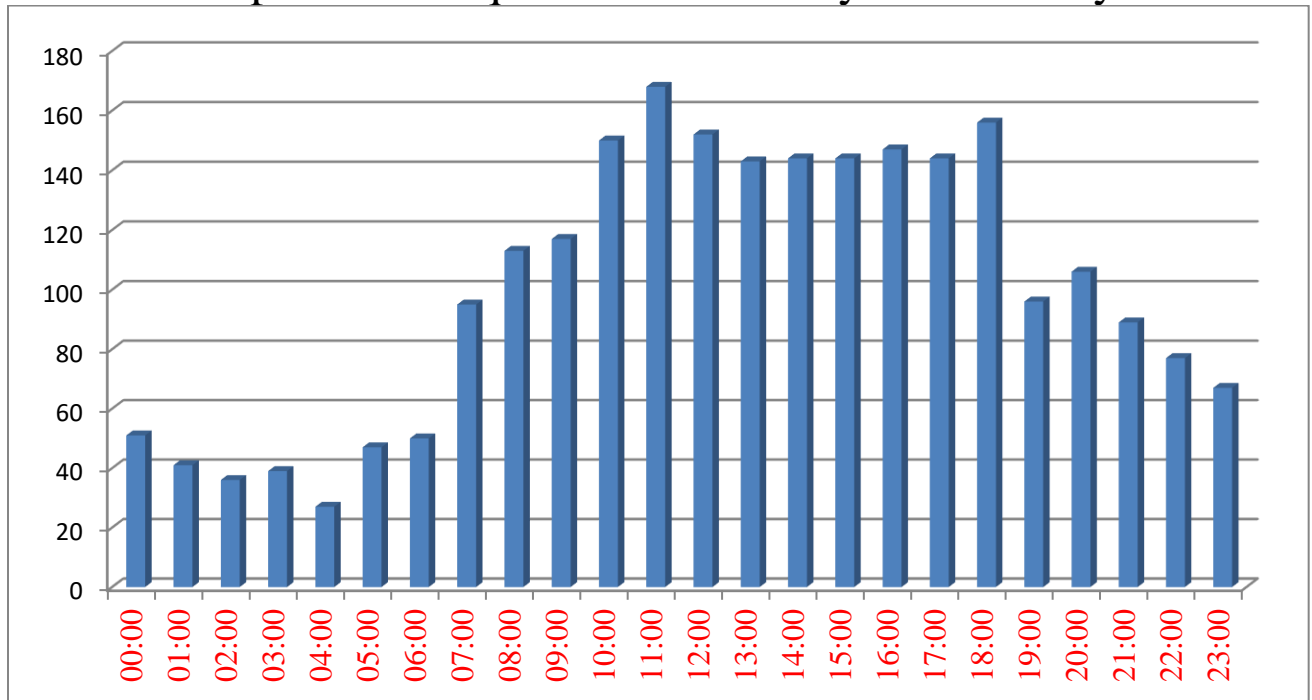


**September Request for Service by Day of the Week**

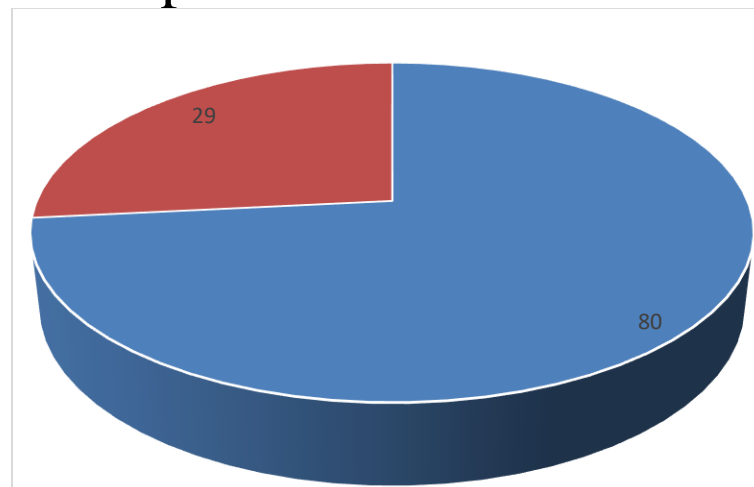




**September-Request for Service by Hour of Day**

Lower Allen Fire Company and Lisburn Community Fire Company personnel attended the following training:

- On Wednesday 9/4/19, 9/18/19, and 9/25/19 Fire Captain Frank Wirth continued the Engine Company Operations class. This class consisted of the following: a discussion on hose-line management, determining hose-line sizes and lengths for various incidents, and conducting National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) Standard 1410 on Initial Fire Attack scenarios. Several timed NFPA 1410 fire attack scenarios were conducted with a supply line being deployed to establish a water supply from a hydrant, fire attack handlines being deployed, and personnel in appropriate personnel protective clothing. All teams participating in the scenarios and improved to the point that their times were within the three to four-minute time frames established in NFPA Standard 1410, depending on the scenario.

On 9/3/19 the Lower Allen Fire Company No. 1 and Lisburn Community Fire Company transitioned to the new Alpine RedNMX software that provides a responder notification app, NFIRS fire incident reporting module, fire prevention/inspection module, and fire equipment inventorying module. The transition had minor issues, but overall it has been a success.

On 9/5/19 Lower Allen Fire Chief Dave Murdoch and Fire Captain Frank Wirth attended a Pennsylvania Building Code Conference Training Session of the Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code that was taught by Code Compliance Officer Bill Yeagley.

On 9/10/19 a Training Committee Meeting was held to discuss the upcoming training schedule for the Fall of 2019, which will primarily focus on Engine Company Operations, Driver Training, Firefighter I Certification Test Preparation, Vehicle Rescue Operations with EMS, Forcible Entry, and Chimney Fire Operations.

On 9/11/19 Public Safety Director Dave Holl and Fire Captain Frank Wirth attended the September 11<sup>th</sup> ceremony sponsored by the Lower Allen/Hampden/Enola VFW Posts at the Hampden Township Veterans Park.

On 9/17/19 Township Manager Tom Vernau, Finance Director Rick Grove, Public Safety Director Holl, Lower Allen Fire Chief Dave Murdoch, and Fire Captain Frank Wirth met with representatives of Pierce Fire Apparatus and Pierce Financial Services to discuss lease/purchase options available for fire apparatus purchases. The purpose of the discussions was to explore possible financing options for future purchases of fire apparatus.

On 9/19/19 EMS Captain Tony Deaven and Fire Captain Frank Wirth met with Robert Stakem, Director of the Senator John J. Shumaker Public Safety Center at Harrisburg Area Community College to discuss EMS and Fire Training/Certification opportunities for EMS personnel, Public Safety Officers, and Volunteer Fire Company personnel.

On 9/21/19 Lisburn Community Fire Company and Lower Allen Fire Company No. 1 conducted a Gun Raffle as a joint fundraising event for both fire companies. The Gun Raffle was well attended and a success.

On 9/23/19 Public Safety Director Holl, Police Captain Leon Crone, EMS Captain Tony Deaven, and Fire Captain Frank Wirth hosted a Business and Industry Alliance meeting with several representatives of local businesses in attendance to discuss services provided by the three public safety disciplines and answer any questions from the attendees. South Central Task Force Business and Industry representative George Giangli also presented information on business continuity and vulnerability assessments.

On 9/6/19, 9/13/19, 9/21/19, and 9/27/19 meetings were conducted on the Alpine RedNMX Software Implementation Project for Lower Allen Fire Company, Lisburn Fire Company, Lower Allen Public Safety, and Lower Allen Fire Codes with the following in attendance: Public Safety Director Dave Holl, LAFC Fire Chief Dave Murdoch, LCFC Fire Chief Frank Williamson, LAFC Assistant Chief Chris Trace, Fire Captain Frank Wirth, Fire Inspector Bill Yeagley, and PSO Bryce Landis. After going live on 9/3/19 minor details are being addressed and other modules are being finalized and rolled out to provide more functionality to the system.

On 9/29/19 Fire Captain Wirth traveled to Denver, CO to attend the ALERRT Conference on Active Attack Incidents. The conference provides information on active attack incidents that have occurred throughout the world and how police/fire/EMS can respond to such events in order to reduce the impact to the community.

Fire Captain Frank Wirth continues his Driver/Operator Training on Rescue 12 and Engine 24.

PSO Kettering is continuing his Driver/Operator Training on Rescue 12.

PSO Kidd is still on deployment with the PA Air National Guard, which is to be completed in early 2020.

On 9/21/19 PSO Keegan Toot and PSO Justin Kettering participated in the Walmart Wellness Day from 10 AM to 2 PM with presentations and discussions on Child Car Seat Safety and proper Car Seat Installation.
